# The Value of Biodiversity

One of the important reasons to protect land is to conserve native biodiversity.

Biodiversity is the term we use

to describe the amount of native species that occur in an area. The higher the biodiversity, the more species there are. The more we explore an area, the more biodiversity we may encounter. This is what's happening at Haile Farm Preserve.

Over the last year or so some plant surveys were conducted at Haile Farm.

The RI Wild Plant Society has been looking for native plant species in support of their ReSeeding Rhode Island initiative. Seeds of select species are being collected, in order to make available native plant seeds that are adapted specifically to RI. With a special permit from WLCT, the RI Wild Plant Society surveyed Haile Farm Preserve and identified a few species for this project. You can learn more about this project here: ReSeeding RI


Also at Haile Farm Preserve, the New England Botanical Society (NE Botanical Society) conducted a survey last summer but did not look for seeds. They were more interested in documenting the diversity of plants, and they had some interesting results: Forty-nine species were documented and were scientifically collected and deposited for future reference in Harvard Herbarium. Of these, 22 had never been documented in Bristol County, and an additional 13 had not even been seen in the last century!

These efforts are valuable to the knowledge of the status of native plants in our area, and are a true testament to the value of protecting native habitats!

On April 3, a crew of clean-up specialists came out to the end of Maple Road and sand-blasted away the graffiti that had been marring the boulder there for decades. We are thrilled now to clearly see the makeup of the pudding -stone boulder and to have a fresh, natural view of this area.

# Protected Lands Update

The Warren Land Conservation Trust collectively protects about 200 acres of environmentally sensitive lands, with our premier properties now or soon to be open to the public. Here's a brief summary of recent activity on our properties.

At **HAILE FARM PRESERVE**, the trails are continuously monitored and kept cleared for hikers. Also, over the past few months some meadows were cleared by a local contractor and invasive plants removed.

A large rock at **TOWESET LANDING** that had been vandalized with graffiti was recently cleaned. And thanks to Ed Cabral and a team of volunteers, the kayak rack is now up. Contact the Warren Harbor Master at townofwarren-ri.gov.

Finally, at **SOWAMS MEADOW PRESERVE**, you probably have seen the work here as you drive on Market Street. Through funding from our partner, the Natural Resource Conservation Service, clearing of invasive species has really opened up the view. Native tree species have been planted along the road, and the meadows will be planted with native wildflowers to support pollinators.

Save The Bay has been very busy in the preserve's salt marsh, to help drain the marsh to reverse the effects of sea level rise.

The natural world needs our help to cultivate it, restore it, conserve it, and tend to it. We too need to sink our hands into it. We are losing more and more opportunities to connect with the earth. When we lose this connection, "use" of earth's natural resources becomes exploitation, degradation, pollution, extinction. And then we hurt ourselves: our health, our safety and security, our relationships with each other, and our spirits. And we fail to create a sustainable future.

Fortunately, we can change course. The Land Trust is part of that. We come together to preserve the land in its natural state, protecting these ecosystems for the generations to come. And we engage a sense of wonder, of curiosity, and of caring for all living things.



#### On the land we "own"

Humans are a territorial species. We become vested in the areas we inhabit, defining and defined by our home, our community, our people.

Most of us like to consider ourselves rooted to a particular place. We vest our emotions - pride, protectiveness, joy - in the four walls and the land below that we call home, in the blocks that define our neighborhoods, in the regions that shape us as a people.

But what of the lands that we don't own, but that we have responsibility for? As a volunteer for the Warren Land Conservation Trust, I have mapped boundaries -identifying the edges of what we "own." I have flown kites and lead walks hosting others on these lands. I have cleaned up dump sites, cleared trails, picked trash and removed invasive plants - sprucing up these places

to better enjoy them.
At the end of several hours of bushwhacking and boardwalk building, I feel a sense of pride in the work. And I also feel a sense of ownership.

Which is a conflicting emotion for me. Because I

know that the lands the WLCT "owns" it really only holds in trust, as a steward of the lands.

These lands are dedicated to both to the people of Warren and also to the plants and animals that live there. We protect and conserve these lands for future generations and for the future of the habitat.

I get deep satisfaction from working in the woods and the fields, stewarding these places for myself and for those who come after. I am grounded by these efforts, more rooted.

We find meaning through connections - to our communities, to our lands, to our ideals. The Land Trust makes meaningful connections tangible, in the lands we tend to for our community. Come join me on the lands we steward, and see the places - Haile Farm Preserve, Jacobs Point and Toweset Landing - that we become attached to.
