Fall at Haile Farm

The trails are good, and waiting for you to come and enjoy the change of season. Last summer's rain yielded a bumper crop of nuts and berries, which is good news for our resident wildlife.

We have new anchor systems for the boardwalks to protect against the high tides.

This fall, we collaborated with George Hail Library on a wonderful story walk installation. Families followed a storybook posted along the trail. We are excited to continue this collaboration with the library.



Many thanks to wild plant specialist Doug McGrady for identifying multiple rare native plants at Haile Farm. Doug highlighted the rare coastal sandplain grassland, a hotspot for biodiversity. Some of the threatened plants identified include the Whip Nutsedge (*Scleria triglomerata*), Purple Screwstem (*Bartonia iodandra*), and Knotroot Foxtail (*Setaria parviflora*).

Sowams Meadow

Restoration efforts continue at Sowams Meadow Preserve. Staton's Landscaping, our project contractor, has done extraordinary work to remove invasive plants along the field borders.

Pollinator-friendly wildflower seeds and native grasses are being planted to complement a variety of existing native plants, such as Ironweed, Joe Pye Weed, Goldenrod, Asters, Yellow Thistle.

In the salt marsh, Wenley Ferguson and Ben Gaspar of Save the Bay continue working to restore the natural flow of saltwater through the marsh. This will eliminate areas of standing freshwater that degrades the peat. They have also been removing invasive Phragmites on the marsh edge to help expansion of the high marsh.

So far the results in both fields and marsh are very dramatic. Now finally, you can clearly view the Palmer River from Market Street Much more needs to be done.

Jacob's Point

Out at Jacob's Point, volunteers and Purple Martin enthusiasts Ray Marr and Ginger Brown along with Finn Brudevold engage in the annual Fall ritual of removing and cleaning the Purple Martin array. In the summer, you can see the white gourd housing structures that support the birds' nesting colonies. Most Purple Martins will spend the winter in Brazil, and return to Rhode Island around April.

Recently, we noticed that tides and rain had made certain areas of Marilyn's Trail at Jacobs Point so wet and muddy that walking was difficult. The answer? Installation of a stone base along sections of the trail. The substrate was carefully selected to improve the trail condition and resist erosion.

Everyone enjoyed a spectacular evening on August 1st for our 3rd annual Moonlight Cruise! Nearly 100 supporters joined us on the Prudence Ferry for a beautiful evening of music and food as we watched the supermoon rise over the Mount Hope Bridge. It was a



glorious night on the bay. The annual event is a wonderful fundraiser for WLT and an amazing way to get to know your neighbors!
